

The Matchless Mine was one of the pillars of the Labor fortune and is the last historic mine site open to the public. After Horace died in 1899, Baby Doe lived in a cabin at the mine until she died there in 1935. Knowledgeable and enthusiastic guides lead tours daily.

Built in 1884, this is the oldest of the area's frontier synagogues. This frontier synagogue served a surprising number of Jews in the community until 1914. After a fire in 2006, the building was historically restored to near-original condition and now serves as a museum that documents life during that era for Jewish pioneers.





